

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

JETHRO: THE WISE COUNSELOR Exodus 18:13-27

Larry Hendrix

- 1. We know and hear much about Moses, and very little about Jethro.
- 2. Moses married Jethro's daughter, Zipporah, thus making Jethro Moses father-in-law.
- 3. Moses had the task of leading the Israelites out of the bondage of Egypt.
- 4. After they had crossed the red sea, Jethro heard of their safe arrival and met Moses in the wilderness with his wife and sons.
- 5. Moses told Jethro all that God had done to Pharaoh, and how God had taken care of them on their journey through the wilderness.
- 6. It didn't take long for Jethro to notice that Moses was taking care of all the problems that arose by himself, he could see that Moses was wearing down very fast, so Jethro sat down with Moses and counseled him concerning this matter.
- 7. We would have to say that Jethro was a wise counselor in that he knew the importance of Moses teaching of God's word, but that he needed help.

DISCUSSION:

I. THE IMPORTANCE OF GAINING WISE COUNSEL.

- A. Man does not have the ability to direct is own way.
 - 1. Jer. 10:23
 - 2. John 15:5
 - 3. II Cor. 3:5
 - B. We must gain counsel (advice, judgement, guidance) from somewhere.
 - 1. There are two places, or kinds of counsel that man receives.
 - a. The world Evil counsel.
 - b. God Wise counsel.

- C. When men in the Bible sought and accepted counsel from the world, it brought mistakes and destruction.
 - 1. Num. 31:16
 - 2. I Kings 12
- D. When men today look for counsel in the wrong places, it will bring destruction.
 - 1. Some turn to TRADITION (Matt. 15:9).
 - 2. Some turn to HUMAN REASON (I Sam. 15).
 - 3. Some turn to FEELINGS (Luke 18:11).
 - 4. Some turn to the WORLD (I John 2:15-16).
- E. When men in the Bible sought and accepted counsel from God, they prospered and gained victory.
 - 1. Judges 18:5
- F. Men today must also seek this wise counsel from God.
 - 1. His counsel comes from his word (II Tim. 3:16-17; Psa. 19:7-8).

II. WHAT MADE JETHRO A WISE COUNSELOR?

- A. He trusted God.
 - 1. Exodus 18:10-11.
- B. He understood that God was in control.1. Verse 19.
- C. He was willing to *let* God be in control, he worshiped and served Him (v.12).

III. NOTICE, AND APPLY THE WISE COUNSEL JETHRO GAVE TO MOSES.

- A. (read) Exodus 18:13-27.
- B. Verse 18.
 - 1. Moses was trying to do all the work himself, he was trying to stand alone.
 - 2. Jethro understood that this was too heavy a burden for Moses, and that he would end up wearing himself out.
 - a. This is a good lesson for us today, we must have the help of God and the help of fellow christians.
 - b. I Cor. 3:9
 - c. II Cor. 6:1
 - d. Psa. 133:1
- C. It is very important for us to notice that there is a job for *everyone*.
 - 1. The preacher's can't do it all.

- 2. The Elders can't do it all.
- It takes all the members to do it.
 a. I Cor. 12:4-6, 12, 14-28
- D. If in my human body a part stops working, it cripples my body or keeps me from being able to function properly.
- E. So if you are a member of Christ's body and are not working, you are crippling the church and keeping it from functioning properly.

CONCLUSION:

- 1. When Jethro counseled Moses, he listened, and followed his advice.
 - a. v.24 So Moses hearkened to the voice of his father in law, and did all that he had said.
- 2. Do we follow God's counsel?
 - a. Prov. 1:25 "But ye have set at nought all my counsel, and would none of my reproof"
- 3. Prov. 12:15 "The way of a fool is right in his own eyes: but he that hearkeneth unto counsel is wise."

UZZAH: A FATAL MISTAKE, DISOBEYING GOD II Sam. 6:1-11; Num. 4:15; I Chron. 13:1-14

Jim Day

Thesis: Human wisdom verses Divine Law.

- 1. History of the Ark of the Covenant.
 - a. In the days of Eli and Samuel the Israelites were defeated in battle by the Philistines. The Philistines took the ark as part of the spoil.
 - b. They took the ark to Ashdod and placed it in the temple of Dagon, a Philistine idol.
 - c. The ark was a plague to the Philistines. Everywhere they took it, it caused problems.
 - d. Finally, they sent it back home. Men from Kirjath Jearim brought it to the house of Abinadab. There it stayed for twenty years until David became King of Israel (I Sam. 4-7).
 - e. David decided to move the ark from the house of Abinadab on the hill to Jerusalem. This is where the lesson begins.
- 2. Uzzah is a prime example of how man can get so caught up in his own *ability*, his own *wisdom*, and his own good *judgement* to the point he disobeys God's divine laws.
- 3. Every Christian should take a hard look at the action of Uzzah, then the action of God against Uzzah.

DISCUSSION:

- I. GOD'S LAW CONCERNING THE HANDLING OF THE ARK.
 - A. Num. 4:1-15
 - 1. In the proceeding verses the duties of Aaron and his sons are explained.
 - 2. Then in verse 15 the duties of Kohath and his sons are explained.
 - 3. God plainly commanded the sons of Kohath not to touch any holy thing.
 - B. God's commandments are important.

- C. People who love God will keep his commandments.1. John 14:21, 23

II. UZZAH'S OWN HUMAN JUDGEMENT CAUSED HIM TO SIN.

 - 1. The road must have been rough to cause the oxen to stumble.
 - 2. Uzzah put forth his hand to stabilize the ark.
 - 3. Only the priest could touch the ark. Uzzah was only to carry the ark.
- B. Human judgement will suggest the following;
 - 1. Pragmatism Just as long as you are practical, it does not matter about God's laws. That is wrong.
 - 2. Situation Ethics Just let the situation for the moment determine if the decision you make is either right or wrong. That is wrong.
 - 3. Good Intentions Just as long as you meant well. That is wrong.
 - 4. Uzza had all the above, but sinned against God.
- C. Pragmatism, Situation Ethics, and Good Intentions are paving the road to hell.
 - 1. The world has been caught up in this kind of thinking for a long time.
 - 2. The sad thing is that now the church is beginning to think this way.

III. GOD PUNISHES UZZAH FOR HIS DISOBEDIENCE.

 - 1. Uzzah was punished because he sinned, disobedience.
 - 2. Uzzah was punished because his irreverence.
 - 3. Uzzah was punished because of his unbelief.
- B. Other example of God's punishment.
 - 1. Nadab and Abihu (Lev. 10:1-2).
 - 2. Ananias and Sapphira (Acts 5:1-11).

- C. Uzzah's punishment served as a warning to others.
 - 1. It got David's attention.


- 2. David became afraid. The ark was not moved for three months.
- 3. God let them know He was in the middle of things as always.

CONCLUSION:

- 1. God's law about the ark was plain.
- 2. Human judgement caused Uzzah to sin.
- 3. God punishes for disobedience of His laws.

LESSON TO REMEMBER:

- 4. God had plainly revealed to man what he must do. He expects man to follow that revelation.
- 5. When man follows his own judgment rather than God's, he will suffer the consequences.

GAHAZI: A SERVANT WHO WANTED SOMETHING FOR HIMSELF II Kings 5:20-27

Kent Bailey

- 1. The background concerning this particular incident is found in II Kings 5:1-19, the cleansing of Naaman from his leprosy.
- 2. Here we find an attempt to build a God-pleasing character upon the foundation of self-interests.
- 3. Such foundations may have the appearance of greatness, but to God such is the essence of selfishness and sinfulness.
- 4. We are instructed *WHERE* we must build as well as *WHAT* we are to build (Mat. 7:27).
- 5. Gehazi tried this type of building upon personal gain, and was doomed to sin and separation from God. let us note his:

DISCUSSION:

I. SPECIAL PRIVILEGE.

- A. He was a servant of Elisha, the "man of God" (5:20).
 - 1. The name GEHAZI means "VALLEY OF VISION."
 - 2. No doubt he was vision to the power of God through the acts of Elisha, the man of God.
- B. Although Gehazi lived within a spiritual atmosphere, yet such was the case that he was afflicted with the sin of pride to the point as if the acted as an unconverted heathen.
- C. There is a spiritual application that must be made to the lives of both individual Christians and local congregations.
 - 1. We have had the special privilege of being "In Christ."
 - 2. How do we live?

II. SELFISH PURPOSE.

- A. "As the Lord liveth, I will run after him and take somewhat off him" (5:20).
- B. Here we find an unprecedented opportunity of making one's self rich without robbing his master.

- C. This "I will" was an act of rebellion both against the spirit and honor of his master and God.
- D. Our sin, regardless of how private it may be, casts a reproach upon both our brethren and our God.
- E. Note some specific cases in the New Testament:
 - 1. Rev. 2:1-7
 - 2. Rev. 2:8-17
 - 3. Rev. 2:18-29
 - 4. Rev. 3:14-22
- F. Such a selfish purpose on the part of Gehazi revealed a sinful distrust in God and a desire to usurp his providence.

III. DECEITFUL WORK.

- A. As soon as Gehazi made his decision he enters such with all his might (5:21-22).
- B. After sin entered into his heart he lied against his master.
- C. As soon as the love of money and riches strikes its roots into our hearts covetousness must appear in life as it is seen by God (Acts 5:3).
- D. Today the church of the Lord is within the midst of apostasy. It is very unfortunate that there are members of the church willing to use the love of money to buy false doctrine, and there are preachers willing to sell such!

IV. SEEMING SUCCESS.

- A. His plan to get for himself the silver and garments succeeded beyond his own expectations (5:23-24).
- B. What were his thoughts as he returned from his successful journey?
 - 1. Luke 16:19
 - 2. Psa. 73:3-17
- C. Sin in all its forms has the appearance of being successful, but the end thereof are the ways of death.

V. UNEXPECTED DISCOVERY.

- A. He went in to stand before his master (5:25).
- B. He went in as nothing had happened to mar fellowship or hinder the service to both Elisha and God HYPOCRISY!
- C. The question was raised by Elisha, "Whence comest thou, Gehazi?"
- D. A lie was stated by Gehazi, "NO WHENCE."

- 1. Here is an attempt at self-justification the fatal refuge of a rebellious backslider.
- 2. Elisha's words must have come with pride withering effect when he stated. "Went not mine heart with thee..." (5:26).
- E. His secret sin is laid open and bare before the eyes of both his master and his God.
- F. This application MUST be made in the lives of those today (I Cor. 6:19)!

VI. TERRIBLE PUNISHMENT.

- A. "He went out from his presence a leper as white as snow" (5:27).
- B. His covetousness led him to err from the faith and pierce himself through with MANY sorrows.
 - 1. The sorrow of personal humiliation and shame.
 - 2. The sorrow of alienation from faithful brethren and God.
 - 3. The sorrow of leading this children into the same condemnation.

CONCLUSION:

1. Matt. 16:26



Jim Laws

Dr. Jim Laws was raised in Murfreesboro, TN. He is married to Jan Pendergrass and they have two children.

Dr. Laws received his undergraduate B.A. degree from David Lipscomb University; his M.A. degree from Harding University Graduate School of Religion; and a Ph.D. from Tennessee Bible College. MORDECAI: LOYALTY IN THE FACE OF DEATH (Esther)

Jim Laws

- 1. The book of Esther has long been a favorite of Jews.
- 2. The book of Esther is a favorite of Christian people today.
- 3. Esther was a beautiful Jewish girl who was raised by her older cousin, Mordicai, an officer in the court of Ahasuerus. (This is but another name for the Persian ruler Xerxes.)
- 4. Xerxes became angry with his queen, Vashti, and held a contest to find someone to take her place.
- 5. Xerxes was unaware of Esther's background and ancestry and chose her to be queen.
- 6. Due to Mordecai's refusal to pay homage to Haman, a high official in the Persian government, Haman influenced Xerxes to issue a decree calling for the extermination of the Jews.
- 7. Mordecai persuaded Esther to intervene, at the risk of her own life, on the Jews' behalf.
- 8. Esther found favor with the king and revealed Haman's plot.
- 9. Haman was hanged on the gallows he had built for Mordecai, and Mordecai was given a place of high honor.
- 10. To counteract the decree of execution, the Jews were permitted to kill their persecutors.

DISCUSSION:

- I. THE FEAST OF PURIM (Esther 3:7; 4:24, 26-32).
 - A. The feast of Purim was established in celebration of the deliverance of the Jews.
 - 1. The word "purim" means "lots."
 - 2. It refers to the lots Haman cast to determine the day the Jews were to be massacred.
 - B. The feast of Purim reminded the Jews of the dangers inherent in living in an alien culture.

II. MORDECAI IS AN ILLUSTRATION OF A MAN WHO HAD A LOVE FOR GOD'S PEOPLE.

- A. Mordecai was one of the first to receive the news of intended destruction (4:1-4).
 - 1. The first note of lamentation was uttered by Mordecai.
 - 2. This cry of lamentation was communicated to and taken up by the Jews throughout the empire (4:3).
 - 3. Mordecai sent word of this to Esther (4:5-8).
- B. The christian is to so love God and God's people that he will both mourn over the problem of sin as well as urge others to avoid such in their lives.
 - 1. Sin is the greatest enemy that we have.
 - 2. Sin is terrible in its consequences.
 - 3. We need more preaching on the consequences of sin.

III. MORDECAI IS AN ILLUSTRATION OF A MAN WHO HAD GOD AT THE CENTER OF HIS LIFE.

A. Mordecai understood the law of the Lord.

- 1. Mordecai refused to bow down to Haman because he knew the law of God (Deut. 5:7-10).
- 2. Notice verse 9 of the passage.
- B. Mordecai had a desire to do God's will in the face of great opposition.
 - 1. Mordecai's refusal brought about the anger of Haman on the Jews (3:6).
 - 2. Haman's reaction is found in 3:8, 9, 13.
- C. Mordecai humbled himself before God and implored God's divine help.
 - 1. Mordecai realized that he and his people needed God's help (4:1).
 - 2. Mordecai realized that they were God's people and that they believed in Jehovah and that God watched over them.

IV. MORDECAI IS AN ILLUSTRATION OF A MAN WHO WAS AGGRESSIVE IN DOING GOD'S WILL.

A. Mordecai made the work of God his own work.

- 1. Mordecai took Esther to the king's house to be among the young women, of which one was to be selected as queen, causing Esther to come to the throne at a critical time.
- 2. It was Mordecai who sent word to Esther to go to the king and make a request on behalf of her people (4:5-8).

- 3. It was Mordecai who encouraged Esther regarding her role in God's Providential plans for His people (4:14).
- 4. Notice the encouragement of Mordecai to Esther becomes the challenge to the book: "Who knoweth whether thou art come to the kingdom for such a time as this?"
- B. Mordecai knew that fidelity to God was the sure road to reward.
 - 1. Mordecai was brought to the king and honored, even though the king knew that he and Esther were Jews.
 - 2. The king reversed the orders he had given through Haman.
- C. Mordecai was elevated to premier over the 127 provinces.
 - 1. Read carefully Esther 8:1-16. Give special attention to verses 15 and 16. Study Esther 9:4 and 10:3.
- V. MORDECAI IS AN ILLUSTRATION OF A MAN WHO WOULD CLEAVE UNTO THE LORD WITH PURPOSE OF HEART REGARDLESS OF THE CIRCUMSTANCES.
 - A. Though fearful, Mordecai never entertained the idea of withdrawing from the stand which he made against Haman.
 - B. Mordecai's example is a noble one regarding the providential care of God for His people.

CONCLUSION:

- 1. We can learn valuable lessons regarding life and godliness.
- 2. Esther obeyed Mordecai, her foster father. A lesson America and the world needs.
- 3. Mordecai, as well as Esther, had courage, even though they could have perished. We need that kind of courage today to live the christian life.
- 4. God used Esther and Mordecai as instruments, within His own Providence, for the working out of His purpose for His people. Are we available to God for His work?
- 5. Mordecai was a national figure, declaring his care for his own people. As christians we should exert our influence for the Lord and His church in our respective communities.

JASON: A MAN OF HOSPITALITY Acts 17:5

Kieth B. Cozort

- 1. Acts 17:1-10a Background for our study.
- 2. Paul has come to Thessalonica and has been reasoning out of the scriptures with the Jews for three Sabbaths in the synagogue (vs.1-2).
- 3. He opened and alleged that Christ had to suffer and rise again (v.3).
 - a. **Opening** to explain or unfold, here it means he *explained* the Scriptures in their true sense.
 - b. Alleging laying down the proposition, maintaining that it must be so.
- 4. "And some of them believed, and **consorted** with Paul and Silas" (v.3).
 - a. "Some of them" Jews.
 - b. *Consorted* the word is commonly applied to those who are partakers of an inheritance.
- 5. Trouble arises for Paul and Silas in Thessalonica (v.5).
 - a. The **authors** of the trouble were "those who believed not."
 - b. The instruments of the trouble were "certain lewd fellows."
 - c. What did they do? They "set all the city on an uproar."
- 6. While looking for Paul and Silas the house of Jason is assaulted because he has shown them hospitality.
- 7. Finding them not Jason and certain brethren are taken to the rulers of the city.
- 8. Accusations were made against Paul and Silas.
- 9. Security is taken of Jason and the one with him afterwards being let go.

DISCUSSION:

- I. JASON, THE MAN.
 - A. Who is Jason?
 - 1. Jason, Greek name frequently adopted by Jews named Joshua or Jeshua.

- 2. He is a Jew in Thessalonica.
- Paul calls him one of "his kinsmen," meaning probably a fellow-Jew, and perhaps a fellow countryman (Rom. 16:21).

II. WHAT IS HOSPITALITY?

A. Definition.

- 1. Thayer: Greek term means "hospitable, generous to quests" (p.654).
- 2. Hospitality: in the ancient Near East was tightly bound up in customs and practices which all were expected to observe.
- 3. One who ignored the customs did so at his own peril.
- B. Customs of Hospitality (according to Harper's Bible Dictionary p.408-409).
 - 1. Hospitality was the process of "receiving" outsiders and changing them from strangers into guests.
 - 2. The reception occurred in three stages:
 - a. Testing the stranger.
 - 1) Strangers pose a threat to any community since they are potentially harmful.
 - 2) Therefore they must be tested.
 - 3) The ritual of foot washing marks the movement from stranger to guest (Gen. 18:4; 19:2; 24:32).
 - b. Stranger as guest.
 - 1) It was imperative that strangers be under the protection of a patron, a host, who was an established community member.
 - 2) To offend the "stranger become guest" was to offend the host (Lot Gen. 19:1-10).
 - 3) A guest could infringe the requirements of hospitality by:
 - a) insulting the host.
 - b) showing hostility or rivalry.
 - c) not showing him honor.
 - d) he must not usurp the role of host.
 - 4) A host could infringe the requirements of hospitality by:
 - a) insulting the guest.
 - b) showing hostility or rivalry.
 - c) neglecting to protect the guest.


- d) not showing responsibility to the individual guest.
- e) he must defend each guest against the other since both are guests.
- f) the host could not fail to attend to the guests.
- g) failure to offer the best is to denigrate the guest (John 2:10).
- c. From guest to transformed stranger.
 - 1) The stranger-guest will leave the host either as a friend or enemy.
- C. Jason would naturally be held responsible for his guest behavior.

III. LESSONS TO BE LEARNED FROM JASON.

- A. The importance of hospitality.
- B. Christianity may cost you something.
- C. Showing hospitality brings great rewards.
- D. Standing for the truth brings great rewards.
- E. Showing hospitality may lead to bigger things in the future.

CONCLUSION:

- 1. Jason may be a "minor character" in the N.T. but he teaches us some major lessons.
- 2. There is a need for more Jasons in the church today.



Eddy Craft

ARISTARCHUS: A FAITHFUL COMPANION AND FRIEND Acts 19-27

Eddy Craft

- 1. One of the greatest needs in the Lord's Church today is a desire to be a faithful co-worker in God's work and Aristarchus was just that.
- 2. Aristarcus was a loyal co-worker of the Apostle Paul, Aristarchus hailed from Thessalonica, but was in Ephesus and arrested with Gaius during the riot following Paul's first appearance in that city.
- 3. Aristarcus traveled with Paul from Troas to Jerusalem and from Jerusalem to Rome and shared Paul's imprisonment in Rome.

DISCUSSION:

I. ARISTARCHUS WAS FAITHFUL:

- A. In being faithful to Paul he was also faithful to the Lord that he and Paul served.
- B. The way we treat God's people will determine how God treats us (Matt. 18:21-35; 25:40; Acts 9:4-5). You can't be in fellowship with God and out of fellowship with His church.
- C. Are we faithful? (II Tim. 2:2).
- D. Those that are to be faithful:
 - 1. Stewards (I Cor. 4:2).
 - 2. Virgins (I Cor. 7:25).
 - 3. Ministers (Col. 1:7).
 - 4. Wives (I Tim. 3:11).
 - 5. Servants (I Tim. 6:2).
 - 6. Teachers (II Tim. 2:2).
 - 7. Children (Titus 1:6).

II. FAITHFULNESS AND FRIENDSHIP GO TOGETHER.

- A. Abraham was called the friend of God because he was found faithful (James 2:23).
- B. We have a beautiful relationship of faithfulness and friendship in John 14:15 and John 15:14.

- 1. We are the friend of Jesus only if we obey Him.
- 2. If we think that God is our friend and that we know Him without keeping His commandments, we are wrong (I John 2:2-3).

III. THE IMPORTANCE OF BEING A FRIEND.

- A. Prov. 18:24 "A man that hath friends must shew himself to be friendly: and there is a friend that sticketh closer than a brother."
- B. Prov. 27:6 "Faithful are the wounds of a friend; but the kisses of an enemy are deceitful."
- C. Prov. 17:17 "A friend loveth at all times, and a brother is born for adversity."
- D. The preceding passages place emphasis upon being a friend.

- 1. Being a friend to Jesus will mean being a friend to His church, His Cause until His second coming.
- 2. The work of the church is too important for us to have a lack of appreciation for it.
- 3. Will you be a friend to Jesus? We must serve and sacrifice more.

STEPHANAS: ADDICTED TO THE MINISTRY OF THE SAINTS I Cor. 16:15-16

- 1. I Cor. 16:15 is proof that Stephanas had learned well from his teachers the concept of the church.
- 2. If the church is to fulfill it's nature and achieve it's purpose...
 - a. An individual Christian must be committed to service in the manner which he can give.
- 3. In order to do these things Christians must be prepared.
 - a. If we asked any group of children in a congregation to role play church, the leader would be the preacher, the rest would be told to listen.
 - b. Communication is in only one direction, from pulpit to pews. The implication is that no one else can do anything worth while.
 - c. The preacher is the main doer, everyone else are specters. If the church grows it's to his glory, if it doesn't, then we need a new preacher.
- 4. In order to prepared God's people for works of service, the preacher must carry out his given responsibility (Eph. 4:11).
 - a. Stephanas household did the serving (v.15).
 - b. Leaders are essential, but their task is not to do the work for the members.
 - c. Preachers, Elders and teenagers must prepare the saints for the work of the ministry serving.

DISCUSSION:

I. A VERY NEEDFUL WORK.

- A. Christians in the first century.
 - 1. The Grecians needed to be ministered to (Acts 6:1-4).
 - 2. Brothers living in Judea needed to be ministered to (Acts 11:29).
 - 3. Paul needed to be ministered to (Phil. 2:25-30).
- B. Works of service results in the growth of the church (Acts 2:42-47).

C. The 20th century church must be devoted to works of service (Gal. 6:10).

II. A VERY HONORABLE WORK (I Cor. 16:16).

III. A WORK THAT MERITS RECOGNITION (I Cor. 16:17-18).

- A. Those engaged should be highly esteemed.
 - 1. Because they elevate the tone of the church (Eph. 4:16).
 - 2. Made church stronger by supplying what was lacking.
 - 3. Because they help maintain the peace in the church.
 - 4. Peace is maintained by a spirit (Matt. 5:9).
 - 5. Because they stimulate the zeal in the church (v.18).
- B. Those engaged should be encouraged (v.15).
 - 1. The work is trying (Gal. 6:9).
 - 2. Paul encourages the brethren at Corinth.

IV. A WORK THAT BENEFITS THE WORKER.

- A. They that water others shall themselves be watered.
 - 1. We grow by bestowing.
 - 2. A sure way of getting to heaven, is to get others there.

- 1. No service done in the name of Jesus will go unnoticed (Heb. 6:10).
- 2. God is faithful to authentic servanthood (Matt. 25:23).

TYCHICUS: ONE WHO BROUGHT COMFORT Acts 20:4; Eph. 6:21

Garland M. Robinson

- 1. The Bible is filled with characters, both men and women, about whom much is said:
 - a. Some good: Abraham, Joseph, Paul...
 - b. Some bad: Cain, Jezebel, Haman ...
- There are many of whom little is said yet so much to learn:
 a. Some good: Enoch, Stephanas, Antipas...
 - b. Some bad: Demas, Diotrephes, Alexander the coppersmith...
- 3. This study is about one of whom little is written but one whom so much can be learned from what is written.

I. TYCHICUS IS A LITTLE KNOWN BIBLE CHARAC-TER FROM WHOM WE CAN LEARN MUCH.

- A. His name means: "fortunate."
 - 1. Fortunate for him to be a Christian.
 - 2. Fortunate for Paul to have such a friend.
 - 3. Fortunate for the church to have such a servant.
 - 4. Fortunate for brethren to have one to comfort them.
- B. He was from Asia perhaps the regions of Ephesus.
- C. Nothing is known of his parents or profession.
- D. By nature, he was affectionate, faithful, worthy of confidence.

II. WHAT THE BIBLE SAYS OF HIM.

- A. Is mentioned by name 5 times in the New Testament.
 - 1. Acts 20:4 He accompanied Paul into Asia
 - 2. Eph. 6:21 Paul describes him as a "beloved brother and faithful minister in the Lord."
 - a. "Beloved brother" describes Paul's personal feelings for him. From what Paul said of John Mark when he left the work, we know he would not have been so complimentary of Tychicus had he not been worthy.
 - b. "Faithful minister" describes his labors. A good minister:

- 1) Studies the word of God (II Tim. 2:15).
- 2) Teaches the word faithfully without favor or compromise (II Tim. 4:2).
- 3) Exercises himself continually unto godliness (I Tim. 4:7-8; 6:6,11; II Peter 1:5-7; 3:11).
- 3. Col. 4:7 He is also said to be a "fellow servant" which describes his usefulness.
- 4. II Tim. 4:12 $\$ only his name appears both Timothy
- 5. Titus 3:12 \int and Titus knew him well.
- B. Not honored by conferring some worldly degree upon him.
 - 1. How unlike men today that take great delight in listing their worldly attainments and socialistic achievements.
 - 2. A simple "beloved brother, fellow servant and faithful minister" says more than any glorious commendation that men may ascribe to us.

III. WHY GOD MAY HAVE CHOSEN TO INCLUDE HIS NAME IN INSPIRED HISTORY.

- A. Because of the work he did.
 - 1. Acts 20:4 He accompanied Paul in the Lord's work traveling extensively and placing his life in peril.
 - a. Not like Demas (II Tim. 4:10).
 - b. Not like the ones who receive seed on "stony ground" and "among thorns" who fall away in time of temptation (Matt. 13:21-22).
 - c. Not like the rich young ruler (Mark 10:22).
 - Some today will go with you to ballgames, fishing, picnics
 but nowhere to be found when it's time to do the Lord's work.
- B. Because of his ability to comfort the saints.
 - 1. Col. 4:8 "All my state shall Tychicus declare unto you... Whom I have sent unto you for the same purpose, that he might know your estate, and comfort your hearts."
 - a. Bringing a message of Paul's welfare while he was in prison would bring comfort to the brethren.
 - b. It was a comfort to know that his imprisonment served in the furtherance of the gospel (Phil. 1:12).
 - 2. Who could know better than Paul what ability Tychicus had to bring comfort to others?

- a. It is comforting and encouraging to hear of others who are remaining faithful through all the trials and hardships of the years.
- b. There are many brethren and churches whose names are not in the limelight but are faithful just the same.
- 3. Tychicus showed brethren the value of continuing faithful.
- 4. Eph. 6:21; Col. 4:7
 - a. He served others.
 - b. He didn't have to be served himself.
- C. Because of his dependability.
 - Acts 20:5 "These going before tarried for us at Troas."
 a. Tychicus was sent ahead.
 - b. Paul knew he could be counted on.
 - c. He was not like Felix in Acts 24:25 that put off obeying the gospel.
 - d. He was not like Demas (II Tim. 4:10).
 - e. He was not like Mark (Acts 15:38).
 - 2. Col. 4:8; Eph. 6:22
 - a. He comforted the saints.
 - b. He did not go ahead of Paul and stir up trouble.
 - c. He carried reports to and from Paul.
 - d. You could depend on what he said.
 - 3. Even though Paul was in prison, Tychicus had not abandoned him.
 - 4. He was a "beloved brother." He had proven himself worthy of Paul's love and confidence.
 - 5. The fact that Paul wrote of him as a "fellow servant" suggests being equal with Paul. He was dependable.
 - a. This shows Paul's humility.
 - b. Preachers today would do well to follow Paul's example and speak of fellow gospel preachers not as "assistant ministers" or "youth ministers" but "fellow servants."
- D. Because of his attitude.
 - 1. He is not mentioned as having to be number one.
 - a. Some people resent taking the back seat, they have to be out front.
 - b. But by Tychicus being sent by Paul to different places suggests he was content and willing to be used in the kingdom wherever he could be used. See II Tim. 4:12 and Titus 3:12.

- c. Some brethren will not work unless they get due credit. How sad! God keeps count. Serve him!
- 2. Matt. 18:1-4 Jesus taught humility
 - a. Caleb showed no rivalry toward Joshua when he was chosen to succeed Moses.
 - b. Jonathan, son of King Saul, was most willing for David, his best friend, to succeed Saul on the throne.
- E. Because he knew what was going on.
 - 1. Eph. 6:21 He could give an accurate report of Paul's affairs.
 - 2. It is tragic today that fellow saints, yea even elders and preachers, claim to know nothing of the digression currently taking place in the Lord's church!
 - a. False doctrine and compromise is tearing the Lord's church apart, not only around the world, but in our own back door.
 - b. Every kind of "ism" is being taught and fellowshipped: liberalism, antism, Crossroadsism, denominationalism, humanism, agnosticism, the new hermeneutic.
 - 3. Every gospel preacher and eldership must search and be informed concerning what is going on and impart the same to their membership!
- F. Because of the company he kept.
 - 1. Acts 20:4-5 He was a traveling companion of faithful men.
 - 2. I Cor. 15:33 "Be not deceived: evil communications corrupt good manners."
 - a. Prov. 4:14 "Enter not into the path of the wicked, and go not in the way of evil men."
 - b. Prov. 13:20 "He that walketh with wise men shall be wise: but a companion of fools shall be destroyed."
- G. Because of his benevolent spirit.
 - 1. He, along with Sopater of Berea; Aristarchus and Secundus of the Thessalonians, Gaius of Derbe, and Timothy of Asia, and Trophimus (Acts 20:4-5) were on their way to Jerusalem with a contribution for the needy.
 - 2. A number of churches had sought to relieve the need in Judea (I Cor. 16:1-2).
 - 3. He was interested in helping relieve the poor.

- 1. When we study the character of such a man as Tychicus, how does our own life compare?
- 2. Could it be said of you that you are a faithful brother or sister in the Lord?
- 3. Are you a fellow servant in the Lord's kingdom?
- 4. Are you dependable?



Charlie Franklin Arnett

Charlie Franklin Arnett was born near Lynn Grove, in Calloway County, KY on September 14, 1913, just two weeks after the death of his father. He grew up on the farm and lived most of his young life with his grandparents.

He attended the rural schools of Calloway County and graduated from the Lynn Grove High School as class salutatorian. He was the representative of the school in debating, public speaking, and math contests.

He obeyed the gospel in August 1928 and started preaching in 1932. He is married to Ruby Herndon and they have six children. Charlie worked as carpenter and electrician for the support of his family.

He attended Freed-Hardeman College 1938-1940 as one of the Aiken Boys (Bro. John Aiken paid their tuition). He has preached in meetings in Illinois, Ohio, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Mississippi, Tennessee, and Kentucky. Also, he has been instrumental in starting congregations in three states. He now preaches for a congregation in Jackson, KY which he is helping to establish.

EPAPHRODITUS: MESSENGER OF THE CHURCH Phil. 2:25-30

Charlie Arnett

- 1. Definition of Messenger one who bears a message or does an errand.
- 2. This shows that one must be dependable, worthy of trust.
- 3. I Cor. 4:1-2 may very well be applied.
- 4. Epaphroditus carried a message unto Paul from the church at Philippi.
- 5. He was also on an errand to supply Paul's needs.

DISCUSSION:

- I. EVERYTHING THAT IS RECORDED OF EPAPHRODI-TUS IS FOUND IN PHILIPPIANS 2:25-30 AND 4:18.
 - A. Therefore, let us notice what *is* said concerning this messenger of the church.
 - B. Also, let us notice that all of us are messengers of the church and of Christ in some way.

II. WHAT IS SAID OF THE MAN.

- A. Paul calls him "my brother."
 - 1. We need to have today a deeper respect for the fact of the brotherhood in Christ.
- B. Companion The thought of working together.
 - 1. Companionship in Christ.
 - 2. We are in this work together and therefore meed to be of the same mind and strive for the same things.
 - 3. In Christ no one lives to himself (Rom. 14:7-8).
- C. Fellow soldier soldiers together.
 - 1. In the same army.
 - 2. We are also in this same army.
 - 3. What kind of soldiers are we (II Tim. 2:3)?
 - 4. What are we doing to stand (Eph. 6:11-13)?
- D. Brother, companion, fellow soldier, all show a close relationship.

III. THE MESSENGER OF THE CHURCH AT PHILIPPI.

- A. It is generally believed that Paul was in prison in Rome at this time.
 - 1. The message Epaphroditus carried unto him probably was to encourage him in the situation he was in.
- B. To administer unto his needs in whatever way he could.
 - 1. Paul said, "He ministered unto my wants."
 - 2. "Wants" here is used as needs.

- 1. To have a greater appreciation for Epaphroditus and his service we need to consider the conditions of the church at Philippi (see II Cor. 8:1-8).
 - a. They had fellowship with Paul from the first day (Phil. 1:5; 4:15-16).
 - b. The secret "They first gave themselves." This would answer many questions today, and solve most problems.

Wesley Simon

- 1. Not much said about him.
- 2. We can learn a lot about him from the little which is said of him.
- 3. His name reveals something about his character, for Onesiphorus means "profit bringer."
- 4. Some brethren ought to be re-named:
 - a. Sister Loose-Lip
 - b. Brother Tight-Wad
 - c. Sister Miss-The-Services
 - d. Brother Down-In-The-Dumps
 - e. Sister Mad-At-The-World
 - f. Brother Preacher & Elder-Hater
 - g. Sister Don't-Ask-Me-To-Do-It
 - h. Brother It-Won't-Work
 - i. Sister Excuse
 - j. Brother Meant-To
- 5. Consider these verses (II Tim. 1:15-18).

DISCUSSION:

- I. WE MUST SERVE GOD AND OUR FELLOW MAN THOUGH OTHERS FAIL.
 - A. Phygellus and Hermogenes failed (II Tim. 1:15) but this was no excuse for Onesiphorus.
 - B. Judas Iscariot failed (Matt. 27:3-8) but this was no excuse for the rest of the apostles.
 - C. Ananias and Sapphira failed (Acts 5:1-11) but this was no excuse for the rest of the church.
 - D. The majority of the human race is going to fail (Matt. 7:13-14) but that is no excuse for us.
 - E. Onesiphorus did his job by serving a brother who was in prison (Matt. 25:35-46).

II. BRETHREN SOON FORGET.

- A. Paul helped to establish many of the churches in Asia, but now his brethren have forsaken him (II Tim. 1:15).
- B. This is why we have the Lord's Supper (I Cor. 11:23-25).
- C. This is why we need to attend every service (Heb. 10:25).

III. WE NEED TO GIVE WHAT WE CAN AFFORD TO GIVE.

- A. Onesiphorus gave to Paul what he needed (II Tim. 1:15-18).
- B. Paul gave to Onesiphorus what he could afford he prayed for him and his household (II Tim. 1:16,18).
- C. Peter and John gave to the man at the gate called Beautiful what they could afford (Acts 3:1-8).
- D. Compare II Cor. 9:6-7.
- E. The Catholics have produced a false doctrine from verses 16 & 18.
 - 1. They teach you can pray for the dead.
 - 2. They teach you can pray one out of purgatory.
- F. Luke 16:19ff destroys the aforementioned false doctrine.

IV. WE NEED TO BE DOING SERVICE FOR GOD AND OUR FELLOW MAN ON A REGULAR BASIS.

- A. "For he oft refreshed me" (II Tim. 1:16).
- B. Onesiphorus looked for the opportunity to serve. II Tim. 1:17 "But, when he was in Rome, he sought me out very diligently, and found me."
- C. We make excuses many times by saying:
 - 1. I cannot find anyone to help.
 - 2. He deserves what he is getting.
 - 3. I cannot afford to get involved.
 - 4. It is too dangerous.
 - 5. Someone else will help him.
 - 6. He will make it.
 - 7. You cannot help a person like that.
- D. But God will not except excuses (Luke 14:15-25).

V. CHARITY STARTS AT HOME.

- A. Why did he search for Paul in Rome?
- B. Because he served Paul and his fellow man at home (II Tim. 1:18).

- C. Have you ever heard one say he would like to go to Africa and be a soul winner. Well brother, if one will not win souls here, he would not win souls in Africa.
- D. One might say, "If I had a million dollars, I would do thus and so." Question: What are you doing with what God has given you now?
- E. Onesiphorus worked at home and on the road.
 - 1. He was a Christian on location.
 - 2. Wherever he was, he did the Father's will.

- 1. We need more who are willing to serve.
- 2. Thank God for Onesiphorus.
- 3. Pray to God that His tribe will increase.



Clayton Winters

Clayton Winters was born near Mountain City, TN on July 15, 1931. He and his wife, Vivian, are the parents of three children: Evelyn, Sandra, and David.

DEMAS: LOVED THE PRESENT WORLD II Tim. 4:10

Clayton Winters

- 1. Background material necessary for a proper understanding and application of the lesson:
 - a. Demas was a fellow laborer with Paul in the great work of spreading the good news of the Kingdom of God (Philemon 24).
 - b. During Paul's first imprisonment at Rome, he joined that apostle and Luke in sending greetings to the church at Colosse (Col. 4:14).
 - c. During Paul's second imprisonment, and evidently shortly before his execution, Demas forsook him because of his love for the present world.
- 2. The apostasy of this faithful gospel preacher must be considered under three distinct possibilities.

DISCUSSION:

- I. HE LOVED THE WORLD IN THE SENSE THAT HE WAS UNWILLING TO DIE FOR THE CAUSE OF CHRIST: "HAVING LOVED THE *PRESENT* WORLD."
 - A. Christianity has often been a life-or-death situation.
 - 1. Matt. 10:21,22,39
 - 2. Acts 15:25,26
 - 3. Rom. 16:3,4
 - 4. Rev. 21:11
 - a. Stephen (Acts 7:59,60).
 - b. James (Acts 12:1,2).
 - c. Paul (2 Tim. 4:6-8).
 - d. Antipas (Rev. 2:13).
 - e. Beheaded for Witness of Jesus (Rev. 20:4).
 - f. Polycarp (in 155 a.d.): The proconsul urged him, "Swear by Caesar's fortune, and I will release thee. Revile Christ." Polycarp replied, "Eighty and six years have I served him, and he never did me wrong: how

then can I revile my King and Savior?" When he was about to be burned, he laid aside his garments, and took his place in the midst of the fuel; and when they would have secured him with nails to the stake he requested, "Let me remain as I am; for he that has enabled me to brave the fire will so strengthen me that, without your fastening me with nails, I shall, unmoved, endure its fierceness." (McClintock and Strong, Vol. 8, p.362.)

- g. William Tyndale (1536): He was first strangled then burned at the stake. Just before he died, he cried out, "Lord, open the King of England's eyes."
- B. Some failed the tests of persecution, hardships, and death.
 - 1. When they learned that they must eat the flesh of the Son of man and drink His blood, many of the disciples turned and walked with Him no more (John 6:53-60).
 - 2. The disciples thought they could drink the cup of death (Matt. 20:22), but when the acid test came, they forsook Christ and fled (Matt. 26:56).
 - 3. The persecuted churches of Asia had to be warned that only those faithful unto death would receive the crown of life (Rev. 2:10).
- C. Did Demas love the present world to the extent that he feared for his life when Paul's execution neared, thus fleeing to Thessalonica?
- II. HE LOVED THE WORLD IN THE SENSE HE WAS ENTICED BY ITS LUSTS AND SENSUAL PLEASURES: "ALL THAT IS IN THE WORLD, THE LUST OF THE FLESH."
 - A. This is a very prevalent usage of the term world in the scriptures.
 - 1. I John 2:15-17
 - 2. Mark 4:18,19
 - 3. James 4:4
 - B. It was this kind of sensual lust that led:
 - 1. David to corrupt his morals with Bathsheba (2 Sam. 11:2-5).
 - 2. Israel into the arms of Baal (I Cor. 10:7,8).
 - 3. The Corinthian to take his father's wife (I Cor. 5:1).

- 4. The church at Thyatira to the same kind of sins (Rev. 2:20).
- C. So many preachers have fallen prey to these kinds of worldliness. One who cares for his soul must exercise due caution.
- III. HE LOVED THE WORLD IN THE SENSE OF MATERIAL POSSESSIONS: "NEITHER THE THINGS THAT ARE IN THE WORLD, THE LUST OF THE EYE."
 - A. The Bible describes the spiritual problems of one who has an inordinate interest in the material.
 - 1. Mark 10:24,25
 - 2. I Tim. 6:9,10
 - 3. Mark 4:19
 - B. Many gave up their place in the Kingdom of God for this:
 - 1. Judas Iscariot for silver (Matt. 26:14,15).
 - 2. Ananias & Sapphira for goods (Acts 5:1-10).
 - 3. Laodicean church was possessed with goods, but spiritually impoverished (Rev. 3:17).
 - 4. Covetousness, the Bible affirms, is a form of idolatry (Eph. 5:5).
 - C. Like the people of Haggai's day (Hag. 1:2-4), we develop a poverty complex with reference to the Temple of God.
 - D. For far less than thirty pieces of silver, we may sell our souls.
 - 1. Unreported taxable income (Rom. 13:7).
 - 2. Misrepresented products of barter (Prov. 20:14).
 - 3. Depriving a working man of his just wage (James 5:4).
 - 4. Getting involved in pyramid and other get-rich-quick schemes (the man on the bottom gets rich, and the man on the top gets stuck).
 - 5. Robbing God by a failure to give as prospered (Malachi 3:9,10).

- 1. In whatever way Demas "loved the present world" think what a terrible price he paid for it.
- 2. Let's all work and pray that we not make the same mistake.



David R. Pharr

David R. Pharr was born in Wilkesboro, North Carolina. He and his wife, Peggy, have four children, James, Neal, Stephen, and Beth. They also have four grandchildren.

Brother Pharr attended Freed-Hardeman College, Rio Grande College, and Alabama Christian School of Religion. From 1964 to 1988 he preached at the Charlotte Avenue Church of Christ in Rock Hill, South Carolina. Since November of 1988 he has been Director of East Tennessee School of Preaching and Missions.

ALEXANDER THE COPPERSMITH: ENEMY OF CHRISTIANS II Tim. 4:14-15

David Pharr

- All people ought to love and respect those who are faithful servants of Christ. We know, however, that such is not the case. (See Matt. 5:10,11; 10:22; John 15:18; Acts 28:22; 2 Tim. 3:12). Paul, a man who gave his life to help all men was opposed and persecuted by many.
- 2. Alexander the coppersmith was one who was named by Paul as an enemy, with the warning that Timothy should be on guard against him.
 - a. There are five references to the name Alexander in the New Testament. The name was sufficiently common that we may not be able to identify the one in the text with any other reference.
 - b. It is frequently suggested, however, that this is the same Alexander as named in I Tim. 1:19,20. We cannot be certain of this, but if he was the same man, we see that his opposition to Paul was ongoing, that he was an apostate, that he had been guilty of blasphemy, and that discipline had not brought him to repentance.
 - c. The word translated coppersmith can mean a worker in various metals. Some have thought that he made idols and that this was the reason for his opposition.

DISCUSSION:

- I. HE WAS AN ENEMY OF MEN OF GOD HE "DID ME MUCH EVIL."
 - A. He did Paul harm & was a danger to Timothy.
 - B. Christians may expect that they will have enemies in the world (I John 3:13; I Pet. 4:16; II Tim. 3:3-12; John 15:18-19; Matt. 5:11-12; Prov. 29:27).
 - C. One who is an enemy of the Lord's people is equally an enemy of the Lord (Acts 9:1-2, 4).

D. We are not told specifics of how Alexander did evil to Paul. Enemies of Christians may harm them in various ways: physically, by fraud, by slander, by injustice, abusive speech, etc.

II. HE WAS AN ENEMY OF THE DOCTRINE TAUGHT BY MEN OF GOD – "HE HATH GREATLY WITH-STOOD OUR WORDS."

- A. He interfered with the teaching of the truth. He did not want the will of God to be known.
- B. Paul was a messenger of the Lord. What he taught was from God. To oppose what he taught was to oppose the truth of God.
- C. We are not inspired today, but when we teach in harmony with the Scriptures it is as certainly truth from God as when the message was directly from the apostles. Those who withstand the truth today are enemies of Christ and Christians just as was Alexander (Phil. 3:18).

III. HE WAS AN ENEMY WHO NEEDED TO BE EXPOSED BY NAME.

- A. Some people think that the names of those who oppose the right way should never be exposed. The text before us shows that there is a time to name names.
- B. Paul was not guilty of "Judging" as is often charged against those who expose enemies of the cause of Christ.
- C. Enemies need to be named when:
 - 1. It is the most effective way to show them the error of their deeds (I Tim. 5:20).
 - 2. It is necessary to caution others to be on guard against them (Rom. 16:17).

IV. HE WAS AN ENEMY WHO WOULD SUFFER THE CONSEQUENCES – "THE LORD REWARD HIM ACCORDING TO HIS WORKS."

- A. This was not a desire for vengeance on Paul's part, but his recognition of the certainty of Divine judgement. It clearly shows his willingness to leave judgement in God's hands (Rom. 12:17).
- B. Often we may be perplexed that there seems to be no way to stop those who oppose us and the truth. Our trust must be

that God will see that justice is done (Col. 3:25; II Thess. 1:6; II Pet. 2:4-9).

- 1. We would like to live among men who always treat us right, who always agree with the truth, who never in any way hinder righteous living or the gospel message.
- 2. But such is not the world we live in (John 15:20).
- 3. Just as Paul did, we will suffer evil at the hands of men like Alexander. We cannot change this reality, but we can be faithful (Rev. 2:10).
- 4. Let us guard against every enemy and be bold to warn others (I Cor. 16:13).
- 5. Let us have faith that God will be just both in saving the righteous and in judging our enemies.



Joe Hoskins

Joe Hoskins was born in Hazard, KY, on March 4, 1919. He is married to Theda Bozarth Hoskins and they have four children: Linda, Taylor, Pamela, and Melissa; and six grandchildren. All of their children are faithful members of and workers for the Lord's church.

Joe was baptized into Christ in 1950 by Aubry Phelps in Cincinnati, Ohio. Soon after his conversion he felt the desire and zeal to preach the gospel. Therefore, upon being supported by some of his brethren he was able to receive training and then in 1952, he began his career as a full time minister and evangelist. Joe has served in this capacity for the past thirty-eight years. He has conducted meetings in Ohio, Michigan, Kentucky, Indiana, Alabama, Kansas, and California.

GAIUS: A MAN OF CHARITY 3 John

Joe Hoskins

- 1. The name Gaius was one of the most common of all Roman names.
 - a. Gaius of Macedonia: A companion in travel of the Apostle Paul (Acts 19:21). He was one of those who were seized by Demetrius and other silversmiths in the riot at Ephesus.
 - b. Gaius of Derbe: Among those who accompanied the Apostle Paul from Greece as far as Asia during his third missionary tour (Acts 20:4).
 - c. Gaius: Host to Apostle Paul; Host to the Apostle Paul when he wrote to the Christians in Rome who joined in the sending of his salutations (Rom. 16:23).
 - d. Gaius: Whom Paul baptized at Corinth (I Cor. 1:14).

DISCUSSION:

- I. GAIUS: A MAN OF CHARITY (3 John 1:8).
 - A. 3 John 1:2 "Beloved, I wish above all things that thou mayest prosper and be in health, even as thy soul prospereth."

II. JOHN IDENTIFIES HIMSELF AS "THE ELDER" (3 John 1:1).

- A. The elder unto Gaius whom I love in the truth.
 - 1. Why should we love the truth?
 - 2. What will truth do when learned and applied (John 8:32)?
- B. Walk in Charity.
 - 1. 3 John 1:3 "For I rejoiced greatly, when the brethren came and testified of the truth that is in thee, even as thou walkest in the truth."
 - 2. 3 John 1:4 "I have no greater joy than to hear that my children walk in truth."
 - 3. 3 John 1:5 "Beloved, thou doest faithfully whatsoever thou doest to the brethren, and to strangers..."

- 4. 3 John 1:6 "Which have borne witness of thy charity before the church: whom if thou bring forward on their journey after a godly sort, thou shalt do well..."
- 5. 3 John 1:7 "Because that for his name's sake they went forth, taking nothing of the Gentiles."
- 6. 3 John 1:8 "We therefore ought to receive such, that we might be fellow helpers to the truth."

Don Flatt

After three years at Freed-Hardeman, Don Flatt received his BA and MA degrees from Morehead State University, and his Ph.D. degree in history from the University of KY. He is now beginning his 30th year on the history faculty at Morehead State University and has served as departmental chairman for eight of those years.

Preaching his first sermon in 1952, he has been a member of the Flatt Brothers' Campaign for Christ since 1963. They have conducted campaigns in 11 states with as many as 56 responses in a campaign. Next year's campaign will be in the Bahamas.

Don is now preaching two Sundays each month at West Liberty and two Sundays coast-to-coast. His "Good News" (a one minute radio spot), is heard on 9 stations in 7 states. His program, which was broadcast for a year to two-thirds of the world's population, won KY's 1990 Media of the Year Award.

DIOTREPHES: LOVED THE PRE-EMINENCE 3 John 9

Don Flatt

- 1. Illustrations about loving the pre-eminence.
- 2. The speaker has developed his point of view from the text and from having served at every "level" in the church:
 - a. Baptized at the age of 12, I was almost paralyzed with fear the first time I led a public prayer, served communion, and when I preached my first sermon.
 - b. Becoming a "Boy preacher" at the age of 15, I have served as a local minister, an elder, radio speaker, writer, and evangelist for 39 years.
- 3. 3 John allows us to peek behind the curtain at the actual workings of a first-century local congregation.

DISCUSSION:

I. THE MEANING OF THE TEXT ITSELF:

- A. The first century had three layers of organization:
 - 1. Apostles who had been in the very company of Jesus and had witnessed his resurrection, regarding themselves as having a right to rebuke.
 - 2. Itinerant prophets who were not directly connected with any local congregation, served the church at large.
 - a. Those who were preaching dangerous doctrines were not to be accepted or shown hospitality.
 - b. Others were loyal disciples and Gaius was right in accepting them (vs.6-8).
 - c. John instructed Gaius to receive Demetrius and not to be intimidated by the domineering Diotrephes.
 - d. Since ancient inns were flea-infested and dirty, a problem arose over where these prophets would stay.
 - e. The church leader had to practice hospitality (I Tim. 3:2; Titus 1:8).
 - 3. Elders had been ordained in every congregation (Acts 14:23).

- a. Most of these were solid in their convictions & daily walk with the Lord.
- b. But, there were those local church leaders, like Diotrephes, who loved the pre-eminence.
- c. So, John gave him an unqualified rebuke. Envy, pride, jealousy, and selfish ambition have nothing to do with the one who "came not to be ministered unto, but to minister" (Matt. 20:28).
- d. Such local dictators would brook no rival from the brotherhood-at-large (John) or from the local congregation either (Gaius).
- e. Attacking John "with malicious words" Diotrephes is a person of overweening ambition, arrogance, and conceit.
- B. Trouble was almost certain to arise in the early church because of the three layers of organization and because of human nature.
 - 1. The apostles' pronouncements were normally undisputed.
 - 2. The itinerant prophets were in the center of most controversies. These wandering preachers had given up their occupations and a settled existence to preach.
 - Sometimes, the most undesirable characters were counted in this number — they lived in great comfort at considerable expense off local congregations.
 - 4. The quality of the church greatly depended upon a stable and Scriptural set of elders.
- C. Eventually, these wandering prophets faded from the scene, the apostles died off, and the elders became the permanent ones in authority, even as the Lord intended.

II. APPLICATION OF THE TEXT TO THE CHURCH OF THE 20th CENTURY:

- A. The love of pre-eminence causes trouble wherever it rears it's ugly head:
 - 1. Pope over a pyramid structure of authority.
 - 2. One who sets himself up as "pope" (John Calvin "Pope of Geneva").
 - 3. National head of any denomination.
 - 4. Head of a religious school.
 - 5. Editor of gospel papers.
- B. The love of pre-eminence appears in various places:

- 1. Among any elders who have fallen in love with their position.
- 2. Among church members who know they are not qualified but who act like elders anyway (I Tim. 3:1-7; Titus 1:5-9).
- 3. Among preachers who try to control or dictate to every congregation in a region.
- 4. Among preachers who question each other's soundness because of jealousy.
- 5. Among preachers who take the scriptural position against being called "Reverend" but then get upset if the one introducing them does not praise him enough.

CONCLUSION:

- 1. The Bible teaches humility as the most useful trait for a "man of God."
 - a. The text, John 13, and Philippians 2.
 - b. Trouble always results when more than one "god" appears in the church.

HERODIAS: THE EVIL PLOT, AN EVIL INFLUENCE Matt. 14:1-12; Mark 6:16-28

DISCUSSION:

I. BACKGROUND OF HERODIAS.

- A. Grandfather Herod the Great who tried to destroy Jesus in the massacre of infants.
- B. Father Aristobulus, who also was father of Agrippa the Great.
- C. Herodias first married Herod Philip, son of Herod the Great by Mariamne, second daughter of Simon the high priest. By Philip she bore Salome. Philip was later disinherited.
- D. Herod Antipas was son of Herod the Great by Malthace and thus half-brother to Philip who was married to Herodias. Antipas was married to the daughter of Aretas, king of Arabia. He got Herodias to agree to marriage if he would divorce the king's daughter, totally against Jewish law.
- E. Later both Herodias and Antipas were banished to Spain where they died.

II. HERODIAS' PLOT AGAINST JOHN, THE BAPTIST.

- A. She had John put in prison by Herod Antipas because John had told them, "It is not lawful for thee to have her" (Matt. 14:4; Mark 6:17-18; Luke 3:19-20).
- B. John had told Herod Antipas it was unlawful to be married to Herodias (Lev. 18:16) for he was brother to her first husband (Lev. 20:21). He had also reproved him for all the evils which he had done (Luke 3:19).
- C. Herodias wanted John killed but Herod was afraid of him for he knew he was a just and holy man (Luke 6:20). He also was afraid of the multitudes who counted John a prophet (Matt. 14:5).

- D. Herod had a birthday feast (Matt. 14:6; Mark 6:19-21).
 - 1. These feasts were for the lords, captains, etc. (the elite) and often consumed several days of constant eating, drinking, and debauchery (See Esther 1).
 - 2. Salome, herodias' daughter, was one of those who danced before this drunken group and so pleased the king that he swore with an oath to give her whatsoever she requested even to half his kingdom (Matt. 14:7; Mark 6:23).
 - 3. Salome went to her mother for instructions and brought to the king the request for John's head on a charger. Salome received it and gave it to her mother.

III. SOME OBSERVATIONS.

- A. Herodias' background was wicked.
- B. She cared not for God's laws.
- C. Her heart was void of love.
- D. She had no fear of punishment.
- E. She taught her daughter to live likewise.
